To those of you who are snow birds I can attest to the fact that there is indeed still soil and plant life beneath the white carpet we have lived with for the past two months. And, for those of you who remained in the loving embrace of southwestern Michigan during that time, hibernation may be at an end for another year. As the weather warms and flowers begin to stick their heads out of the ground, we have much to look forward to in the months to come. However, I want to take this time with you to look backwards for a moment.

This past fall a number of our club ventured south to Brazil where we were hosted by the wonderful members of two clubs, Araraquara and Salvador. Upon returning home I began to organize the pictures I had taken and that initially tended to focus my attention on the Salvador exchange since that area has much to commend it in terms of history and natural beauty. However, even though I had a paucity of photographs to remind me of it, I found myself constantly reflecting upon our exchange to Araraquara.

Most decidedly Araraquara was not able to compete with Brazil's third largest city to the north in terms of either history or natural beauty. Still, I have very fond memories of my week there. It was the people, and that is to take nothing away from the people of Salvador who were as gracious as one could hope for. The difference, at least for me, was the generational experiences I had in Araraquara. It seemed to me that all of the events we experienced during that week were multi-generational, a mix of people from our own ages down to children who had yet to experience their first birthday. At our farewell dinner, I saw a grandfather dancing with his granddaughter. And it is those images that have stuck with me. I really was given an opportunity to fully experience their culture - diapers and all.

This is what Friendship Force was once all about. Not simply people developing friendships across the cultural barriers that divide us, but about whole families extending the hand of friendship to one another. As the organization itself has grown older so too has the concept of club-to-club exchanges. We find ourselves many times in the company of those our own age. I would like to see if we can change that at least on a small scale within our own club. I am aware that this is America and, unlike Araraquara, our offspring are most often far removed from the communities of their parents. However, that is not true for all of us.

So, to those of you who have family in the area, I extend an invitation. Please consider including them in some of the events, particularly those that do not require participation fees or have limited space requirements (such as beach cookouts), when we are hosting Friendship Force clubs from elsewhere. It would even do us a world of good to get to know the extended families of our own members. Consider taking one or more of your grandchildren along on an outbound exchange with you. Let's show the rest of the world that we too change diapers and dance with our grandchildren.
