Last September I was finally able to visit my son in South Korea for the first time since Covid. Jacob is an English teacher in Incheon which is about 20 miles from downtown Seoul. We picked September for the trip because the weather is beautiful and he had some time off for Chuseok. Neither teachers or students get many days off in South Korea!

Chuseok is the Asian version of Thanksgiving and is celebrated on the Fall Equinox. It is the second most important Korean holiday after the Lunar New Year. Most businesses and schools close and there's an annual traffic jam as South Koreans head to their hometowns to celebrate with family. It is also a time to honor all relatives, both deceased and alive. I was surprised that the Chuseok Dinner is even more complicated and ceremonial than a Jewish Sedar. And in addition to the 20+ traditional dishes served, you can give your host a "SPAM GiftPack" for only \$65 dollars (yes – that's good old American

Spam)!

So, I was very honored when members of the Seoul Friendship Force took time to meet me for a day during this very busy month. I actually got hooked up with the Seoul Club when my bid won the Friendship Force "Homestay" Auction for Seoul. I had planned to visit and stay with the club in 2020, but we all know how 2020 went. (I was actually on the plane over the Pacific Ocean when the airlines stopped all flights to South Korea!) But we were finally able to connect for a day. Given that it was Chuseok, I didn't want to impose on their holiday. But four members still made time to meet and we had a great time visiting the main palace and sharing Friendship Force stories. They were particularly intrigued to hear about the American television show M*A*S*H – and I'm sure viewing parties ensued!

On the other days when Jacob was teaching, I was able to join several of the free Seoul Walking Tours. English speaking volunteers will take you on walking tours of over 24 different areas and topics. We visited food markets, temples, old and new neighborhoods, ancient bridges and more. Talking to the guides between highlights was a treat as well. (I think I recruited a few new FF members for the Seoul Club too ②.) Most guides were retirees and had mind boggling stories about the Korean War, aftermath and recovery. One guide told me how he, his mother and baby brother traveled on foot over 200 miles to get to safety in Busan during the war. He also told me how his first words in English were "Give me chocolate!" – which he repeated for every American GI he could find.

On another day I accidentally climbed a mountain. Never trust what a Korean calls "an easy hike" – apparently they sent me on the 'easiest' way to the top of Mount Bukhansen. It was a beautiful national park and I constantly ran into ancient bridges and temples built by Buddhist monks centuries/milleniums ago. If you look closely at the photos of the palace throne, you'll see the painting of the five royal mountains. I ended up on top of the second mountain from the right! Fortunately for me, there are still many Buddhist Monks on the mountain, and they supplied valuable water and rest stops for the 6 hour adventure. I have travelled to quite a few countries in my life, but I've never experienced so much "history in the making" as I did in South Korea. As I flew in over Incheon Bay, I realized it was the same bay my father-in-law arrived on to fight the Korean War years ago. The South Koreans are rightfully proud of how they rose from one of the ten

poorest countries in the world to one of the world's richest in less than 50 years. Add to that the lingering bitterness from the Japanese occupation, and you see where they also go to great extents to recover so many buildings and customs that were destroyed during that time. I was surprised to learn that many Koreans over the age of 70 had to learn how to speak the Korean language because they were only allowed to speak Japanese during those years.

The word that South Korea uses to describe this fascinating mix of old and new is "NewTro" – they love the new and they love the "retro". So hanboks and cellphones, temples and freeways, palaces and skyscrapers are the norm, not the extremes. I hate having my son so far from home (and close to Kim Jong-un). But it is an amazing place that I look forward to returning to...
